EXPANDED NEIGHBORHOOD PATROL PROGRAM

Overview

The Expanded Neighborhood Patrol (ENP) program is a valuable initiative that involves off-duty uniformed Dallas PD officers patrolling the UCPID area in marked patrol vehicles. This program offers numerous benefits, including:

Patrols conducted seven days a week for enhanced security coverage.

- Substantially reduced response times, ensuring quick assistance in case of emergencies.
- Regular interactions and collaborations with local businesses, fostering strong business-community relationships.
- Effective information sharing and coordination with other law enforcement agencies such as SMU PD, DART PD, and University Park PD.
- Promotes crucial community engagement, bridging the gap between citizens and law enforcement.
- Proactive patrols to deter crime and enhance overall safety in the neighborhood.

HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

Overview

The UCPID homeless outreach program is a comprehensive initiative aimed at assisting and supporting individuals experiencing homelessness. It involves a team of dedicated professionals who actively engage with homeless individuals on a weekly basis. By actively reaching out to homeless individuals and addressing their immediate needs, this program helps improve their overall well-being, increase their chances of transitioning out of homelessness, and foster community integration. Additional benefits include:

- Increased access to basic needs such as food, shelter, and clothing.
- Enhanced physical and mental health support for homeless individuals.
- Substance abuse counseling and treatment services.
- Linkages to other social services and resources.
- Strengthened community engagement and collaboration.
- Enhanced public safety and community well-being.
- Increased opportunities for homeless individuals to regain stability and reintegrate into society.



DART - LOVERS LN. POLLINATION GARDEN

- In the spring of 2023 The UCPID partnered with DART to install a *Pollination Garden* at the Lovers Ln. DART Station.
 - Under the partnership The UCPID and DART evenly split the cost of the *Pollination Garden*.
 - Pollination Garden The flowers planted in this garden will attract bees and butteflies.
- The purpose of this garden is two-fold: 1) to discourage panhandling in the area; and 2) create a beautiful space that had been previously ignored.
- Next Steps: Enjoy the beautiful new garden!



ART FENCE LOVERS LN. & US75 (ACCESS RD.)

- In spring of 2023 The UCPID approved funding for the installation of a new Art Fence at the intersection of Lovers Ln. & US75 (Access Rd.)
 - The UCPID has commissioned the artist, Michael VanEnter, to install a fence which replicates the fence he installed along the University Crossing Trail (UCT).
- The existing chain linking fence, that sits on the southeast corner of this intersection, will be replaced by an Art Fence.
- The purpose of this Art Fence is two-fold: 1) continue to discourage panhandling at this intersection; and 2) add a colorful and vibrant piece of art to a space that had been previously ignored.
- Next Steps: Enjoy the new art!

UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL VOLUNTEER IN PATROL (VIP) BIKE PATROL

- University Crossing Trail (VIP Bike Patrol): This program is a partnership between DPD, the University Crossing Public Improvement District (UCPID), and Mockingbird Station. Each party brings something unique to the partnership:
 - DPD's Role: DPD trains volunteers in the VIP Program and only those certified in the program can participate in the VIP Patrol
 - UCPID's Role: The UCPID has purchased two (2) bikes, with accompanying equipment, for use in the VIP Bike Patrol
 - Mockingbird Station's Role: Mockingbird Station has agreed to store the bikes on their premises, which allows volunteers easy access to the trail

Next Steps: For the summer & fall of 2023 – The UCPID is looking for volunteers to join this program! The more volunteers we have the more successful this program will be!

2022 - 2023 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

PEDESTRIAN LIGHTING PROJECT (BACKGROUND)

- Background: In 2017 The North Texas Council of Governments (NTCOG) awarded the City of Dallas and the UCPID a reimbursement grant to fund pedestrian lighting along the *University Crossing Trail.* (Note: Under the Funding Agreement, the UCPID will fund approximately 20% of this project, which is close to \$300,000. Additionally, the UCPID will fund certain cost overruns, but the cost has been "capped" at \$750,000. If there are overruns beyond the "capped" amount, with Board approval the UCPID may provide additional funding).
- Background: The UCPID partnered with Dallas Park & Rec. to develop a Funding Agreement to install the pedestrian lighting
- Background: In 2018 The UCPID met with TXDOT, Park & Rec., and other Community Stakeholder to discuss implementation

PEDESTRIAN LIGHTING (UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL)

- In the spring of 2023 The UCPID transmitted its initial payment to begin this project!
 - Based on the UCPID's Funding Agreement with the City of Dallas, the UCPID transmitted \$275,890.
- On May 24, 2023 The Dallas City Council approved this project, paving the way for construction in the summer of 2023!!!
- The Construction Document calls for the following:
 - Light Fixtures from Glencoe Park (near Martel) to Twin Sixties Dr.
 - Light Fixtures from the "Red Line" Bridge, above the DART line, heading east to the Greenville Ave. & Matilda Bridges
 - From Matilda Bridge to Skillman (Phase 1 Completed): Oncor has install light fixtures on existing light poles, located along the trail (NOTE: Oncor installed these light fixtures at NO COST, and the City of Dallas is paying the electricity cost. The UCPID wants to thank Oncor for this generous service!)
 - Total Estimated Cost of Project: \$1,235,000
- Next Steps: Installation begins in the summer of 2023, with completion in the fall of 2023!!!


PEDESTRIAN LIGHTING (PROPOSED AREA)



UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL (UCT) POLLINATION PARK

- The University Crossing Public Improvement District (UCPID) is proud to develop and fund the installation of a pollination park, along the UCT!

UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL (REST AREA)


- The UCPID installed a new Rest Area, along the trail!

- Next Steps: Enjoy the new Rest Area!!!














UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL (DECORATIVE FENCE)


NEW REST AREA (BETWEEN SMU BLVD. & THE REDLINE BRIDGE)

- Next Steps: Enjoy the trail!




MOCKINGBIRD STATION MURAL (EAST FACING WALL & DART PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE)

- Next Steps: Enjoy the art!




NEW SCULPTURE & REST AREA (ALONG THE UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL NEAR PREMIER PLACE)

- In 2022 The UCPID was proud to partner with community stakeholders to install a new Sculpture & Rest Area along the University Crossing Trail.
- This project would not be possible without a partnership between the UCPID, Mockingbird Station, and Premier Place. Each partner brought something unique to this project:
 - **Mockingbird Station:** Mockingbird Station generously donated a sculpture, for public use along the University Crossing Trail.
 - **Premier Place:** Premier Place generously donated the land for the new Sculpture and Rest Area, which sits next the University Crossing Trail. (NOTE: This would not have been possible without the leadership of *Lori Martin and Matt Omundson*)!
 - **UCPID:** The UCPID funded the restoration and installation of the Sculpture and the new Rest Area.

- In the spring of 2023 The UCPID was proud to partner with the Highland Property to install a new trail connection. (**NOTE:** A special thank you to *Larry Walton*, without whom this partnership would not have been possible!)
 - Under the partnership The UCPID and the Highland Property entered into a Cost Sharing Agreement.
- The new trail connection runs from the Highland Property to the UCT, underneath the pedestrian bridge over Mockingbird Ln.
- Next Steps: Enjoy the new connection!

REPAINTING PEDESTRIAN CROSSWALKS

- To promote pedestrian safety The UCPID repainted two (2) Pedestrian Crosswalks in our community.
- The Intersections include:
 - Mockingbird Ln. & Matilda St.
 - Mockingbird Ln. & Greenville Ave.
- These intersections were chosen because of the high pedestrian traffic.
- **Next Steps:** The UCPID will continue to monitor crosswalks in our community to help ensure pedestrian safety!!!

MOCKINGBIRD PEDESTRIAN & BICYCLE STUDY

- In October 2022 The UCPID met with representatives from the City of Dallas, Transportation Dept. (Transportation). During the meeting, the City confirmed its plans to move forward with the improvements outlined in this study.
 - **Background:** Under the City of Dallas' 2017 Bond Package Improvements outlined in the *Mockingbird Pedestrian & Bicycle Study* are designated for funding. (**Note:** The improvements are found in the "*US75/Mockingbird/Lovers Lane Pedestrian Improvements*")
 - Background: In addition to the City of Dallas, TXDOT and the NCTCOG have also pledged to help fund these improvements.
 - Background: TXDOT has already begun implementing improvements from the *Mockingbird Pedestrian & Bicycle Study* (TXDOT's improvements can be found at the intersection of Mockingbird Ln. & US75, in the form of new pedestrian crossings!)
- **Next Steps:** In 2023 The UCPID will partner with Transportation to develop a *Funding Agreement*, which will focus on widening and beautifying the sidewalks along Mockingbird Ln, between US75 and Matilda St.

GREENVILLE AVENUE & KATY TRAIL ENHANCEMENT MASTER PLANS

- In October 2022– The UCPID met with representatives from the City of Dallas, Transportation Dept. During the meeting, the UCPID shared the *Greenville Avenue & Katy Trail Enhancement Master Plans* (Greenville Ave. Plan), to implement the improvements outlined in the plan.
 - **Background:** In 2016 The UCPID commissioned the Greenville Ave. Plan, which was developed by Jacobs Consulting (Jacobs).
 - **Background:** The Plan outlines numerous capital improvements along Greenville Ave., including: upgraded sidewalks, additional street lighting, generous tree planting, and beautification to the medians along Greenville Ave.
 - **Background:** The UCPID used the Greenville Ave. Plan to develop the pedestrian lighting along the trail. With implementation of the pedestrian lighting project now underway The UCPID plans to implement additional recommendations from the Greenville Ave. Plan, with emphasis on improved sidewalks.
- **Next Steps:** In 2023- The UCPID will partner with the City of Dallas to develop a *Funding Agreement*, which will focus on widening and beautifying the sidewalks along Greenville Ave., between SMU Blvd. & Lovers Ln. Additionally, the UCPID will focus on beautifying the medians, along Greenville Ave., between SMU Blvd. & Lovers. Ln.

MATILDA LOT (REIMAGING PUBLIC SPACE)

- In December 2022 SMU's Masters of Arts & Design Innovation (MADI) presented a proposal to reimagine the "Matilda Lot", located north of Mockingbird Ln. along Matilda St.
 - MADI's proposal imagined low impact pedestrian space with rest areas, nature walks, and public art.
- In March 2023 The UCPID met with representatives from the City of Dallas, Park & Recreation Dept. (Park & Rec.) and Dallas Water Utility (DWU), to discuss the proposal.
- DWU owns the property, and they informed the UCPID that they plan to install a new Pump Room on this property. As such, they will not grant the land to Park & Rec., for new park.
- **Next Steps:** The UCPID plans to work with DWU to utilize available space for a better public purpose, such as sequestration garden.

RE-IMAGINING PUBLIC SPACE (MATILDA ST. & MOCKINGBIRD LN.)



PEDESTRIAN "FLASHERS"

- In January 2023 The UCPID met with the City of Dallas, Dept. of Transportation (Transportation) to discuss installation of pedestrian flashers along the trail.
- Specifically, the UCPID offered to pay for installation at two (2) locations:
 - Twin Sixties Dr. & the University Crossing Trail (UCT)
 - Worcola St. & the University Crossing Trail (UCT)
- After assessing both locations, Transportation concluded that a pedestrian flasher at Twin Sixties Dr. is both warranted and doable. Worcola St., however, is more technically challenging because it is next to a DART crossing. As such, that installation is put on hold.
- Next Steps: Transportation is developing an installation plan for a pedestrian flasher at Twin Sixties Dr. & the UCT.

UNIVERSITY CROSSING

2022 - 2023 MAINTENANCE PROGRAMS

MAINTENANCE PLAN (MOCKINGBIRD LANE)

- The UCPID contracts with the landscape company, Green2B, to maintain Mockingbird Lane (Maintenance starts west of US75 (near the CVS) and continues east to Matilda)
 - In 2023 The UCPID replanted the planters with purple sage & yellow lantana to beautify the streetscape
- Green2B also maintains portions of the US75 Access Road Along southbound US75 near Mockingbird Lane
- Repainting Planters: In 2023, the UCPID plans to repaint six (6) planters along Mockingbird Lane, between Mockingbird Station & Matilda Ave.
- **Next Steps:** We plan to continue this Maintenance Plan but welcome any feedback or suggestions.

MAINTENANCE PLAN (SMU BLVD.)

- The UCPID contracts with the landscape company, Green2B, to maintain portions of SMU Blvd. (Maintenance is between US75 & the DART track).
- Green2B is tasked with maintaining SMU Blvd. free from trash and debris and maintain portions of the landscaping – which includes the southside of the sidewalk and the medians
- **Next Steps:** We plan to continue this Maintenance Plan but welcome any feedback or suggestions!



MAINTENANCE PLAN (UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL)

- The UCPID contracts with the landscape company, Green2B, to maintain a portion of the University Crossing Trail (UCT) (Maintenance is from SMU Blvd. to Twin Sixties Dr.)
- Green2B is tasked with maintaining the UCT free from trash and debris and maintaining the landscaping – which includes Spanish Grass
 - The UCPID funds a Porter Service that removes trash and debris from both SMU Blvd. & the UCT.
- **Next Steps:** We plan to continue this Maintenance Plan but welcome any feedback or suggestions.



MAINTENANCE PLAN (UNIVERSITY CROSSING TRAIL – PEDESTRIAN LIGHTING)

- The UCPID maintains the light fixtures along the UCT, from SMU Blvd. to the "Red Line" Bridge. (Note: This includes eleven (11) light fixtures).
- The UCPID pays the electricity for these eleven (11) light fixtures, and provides maintenance when required. (**Note:** After assuming responsibility for these light fixtures The UCPID is now able to ensure this portion of the UCT is illumined).
 - A special acknowledgement to UCPID Board Member, Larry Walton, for walking the trail to monitor these lights!
- **Next Steps:** Enjoy the lighting!!!

MAINTENANCE PLAN (US75 ACCESS ROAD)

- The UCPID contracts with the landscape company, Green2B, to maintain a portion of the US75 Access Road (Maintenance is on the southbound side of US75 near Mockingbird Lane)
- Green2B is tasked with maintaining the Access Road free from trash and debris and maintaining the landscaping
- **Next Steps:** We plan to continue this Maintenance Plan but welcome any feedback or suggestions!

- In 2022- The UCPID installed a new Rest Area underneath the Greenville Ave. & Matilda St. bridges, along the UCT.

Upon completion of capital improvements along Mockingbird Ln. and Greenville Ave., if any Reserve Carry Over remains, funds will be allocated for a Dallas Police Dept. (DPD) Store Front, and a public Dog Park.

 - Carryforward Funds: Using the \$1,500,000 allocated to the *University Crossing Trail Lighting Project,* in the 2023 Service Plan, the UCPID will complete installation of trail lighting. *In 2024, remaining carryforward funds will be used to fund the Mockingbird Pedestrian & Bicycle Improvements, the Greenville Avenue & Katy Trail Enhancements Master Plans, and other important improvements like a police Store Front.*
- **Support Maintenance Programs:** Enhance the quality of life of our community through vigilant maintenance
- Promote our Community: Highlight local businesses on the web and through social media
- **Promote the Arts:** To strengthen community identity and engagement by continuing to support the arts through such programs like the UCPID's public art initiatives.
